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FREE COVID-19 TESTING, FACE MASKS AND SANITIZER AVAILABLE

The **Virginia Beach Department of Public Health (VBDPH)** will hold another **FREE COVID-19** community-based testing event on **Saturday, Sept. 19 from 10 a.m. to noon** at Cornerstone City of Refuge Ministries Church (528 S. Military Highway). Public Health staff and volunteer Medical Reserve Corps nurses will administer the testing for adults and children ages 13 years and older, while supplies last. VBDPH will provide testing only during the event and not medical care or treatment.

As part of the Health Equity Pilot Program, personal protective equipment will be distributed at the testing event as well. Bags for distribution will contain two cloth masks, two bottles of hand sanitizer and literature from the Health Equity Task Force on COVID-19 and mask washing instructions. An additional PPE distribution will also occur next weekend:

APPLY BY SEPT. 25: POLL WORKERS STILL IN NEED FOR UPCOMING NOVEMBER ELECTION

Election officials across the country are reporting critical shortages of poll workers amid the COVID-19 pandemic and Virginia Beach is no exception. **Virginia Beach Voter Registration & Elections** is offering citizens the opportunity to be a part of this year’s election process by being a poll worker at one of our 100 polling locations. Poll workers set up polling places, check in voters, demonstrate how to use voting machines and answer questions. Any voter can file an application to become a poll worker. Virginia Beach pays \$140 to work the polls on Election Day, Nov. 3, and an additional \$20 for attending training.

PAUL NEUDIGATE APPOINTED NEW POLICE CHIEF

After conducting a nationwide search, I have appointed **Paul Neudigate**, a 30-year veteran of the Cincinnati Police Department, as chief of the **Virginia Beach Police Department**. Neudigate's career in Cincinnati includes positions in all levels and areas of the department. His focus on intelligence-led data-driven strategies along with an emphasis on how technology can enhance policing and community safety has resulted in some of the most significant advances in policing in Cincinnati. Under his leadership, Cincinnati saw significant declines in shootings and overall double-digit reductions in both property and violent crimes.



In addition, Neudigate has extensive experience planning for and overseeing public safety operations for major events, from NFL games to headliner concerts and large festivals. He earned a Master of Science in Criminal Justice from the University of Cincinnati and a bachelor's degree in Justice Administration from the University of Louisville. He has also graduated from a variety of advanced executive leadership schools, including the FBI National Executive Institute, Major Cities Chiefs Association Police Executive Leadership Institute (PELI) and the Senior Management Institute for Police sponsored by the Police Executive Research Forum. His first day in Virginia Beach will be Oct. 14.

VOTER INFORMATION REMINDER: VOTE EARLY IN-PERSON STARTING TODAY, SEPT. 18

Early in-person voting (formerly Absentee In-Person voting) for the Nov. 3 election began today. No appointment is needed to come in to cast your vote. Early in-person voting will be available at several locations throughout the City until 5 p.m. on Oct. 31. People are not required to have a reason to vote early. At the Registrar's Office or satellite voting location, they just need to provide their name and address and show an acceptable form of ID or sign an ID Confirmation Statement. For those who chose to vote by mail and want to hand deliver their completed ballots, drop-off locations for ballots are available at the Voter Registration & Elections office (Municipal Center, Building 14, 2449 Princess Anne Road) starting today, at satellite locations Oct. 19-31, and at each polling location on election day. If you would like to request to have a ballot mailed to you for the Nov. 3 election, voters can submit a Virginia Vote by Mail application as soon as today and must submit the application by 5 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 23. COVID-19 UPDATES & RESOURCES

MORE LIBRARIES OPEN WITH LIMITED SERVICES

Virginia Beach Public Library reopened three additional branches on Thursday, Sept. 17. Great Neck, Oceanfront and Windsor Woods libraries, which have been closed to the public since March due to the COVID-19 pandemic, are now open for limited services including browsing and checking out materials, computer, printer and internet access, applying for library cards and registering to vote. The same safety precautions are implemented as are in practice now at Central, Kempsville, Princess Anne and Wahab Public Law Library branches, which reopened on July 20. The TCC/City Joint-Use Library will remain closed until further notice, with holds pickup service available on site.

Additionally, VBPL's Pungo-Blackwater branch closed temporarily for renovations on Sept. 17. Upgrades include new furniture, a more customer-friendly front desk and more. Customers who have holds to pick up on or after Sept. 17 will find their items at Princess Anne Area Library. The \$104,000 renovation project is part of a \$5.8 million Capital Improvement Program (CIP) to renovate eight of 10 VBPL locations. For more information, visit www.VBgov.com/libraries.

CITY IMPROVEMENTS/CLOSURES

- **PRINCESS ANNE ROAD:** Pear tree Removal on Princess Anne Road, between Newtown Road and Alsab Circle, will require a left lane closure this weekend, Sept. 19-20. The Pear Tree Removal & Replacement Program is an ongoing commitment to remove and replace Pear trees in medians on major roadways because they exhibit weak branch structure, are prone to unpredictable failure, and have proven to be invasive in the Hampton Roads area. Work will be conducted by Virginia Beach Parks & Recreation's Park and Landscape Services from 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. each day. Contact: Park and Landscape Services, (757) 385-4461.
- **VIRGINIA BEACH BOULEVARD:** A water main repair will result in the closure of a portion of Virginia Beach Boulevard starting at 8 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 19. To safely facilitate this work, the two inside lanes of westbound Virginia Beach Boulevard between North Lynnhaven Road and Groveland Road will be closed. NEW & NOTEWORTHY

VBFD & VA-TF2 PARTICIPATE IN 9/11 "HONOR WALK"

The 19th anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks was last Friday. Preparations are already underway for ceremonies marking the 20th anniversary with some beginning right here in Virginia Beach. A veteran's group called "**Carry On**" asked the **Virginia Beach Fire Department** and **Virginia Task Force 2** to help them



begin a year-long journey transporting a 700-pound, seven-foot-long "**Honor Log**" because VA-TF2 responded to the attack on the Pentagon on 9/11, conducting search and rescue operations.

The Honor Log is decorated with hand carved tributes to honor the fallen and the survivors of 9/11. Volunteers from VBFD and VA-TF2 along with veterans from Carry On and two other veterans' groups carried the log down the boardwalk from the Navy SEAL Memorial on 38th Street to 2nd Street, and back to the Law Enforcement Memorial at 35th Street, a distance of about six miles. After remaining in Virginia Beach for a short time, VA-TF2 will transport the honor log to the Pentagon before reaching its destination, the National September 11 Memorial in New York City.

Virginia Announces \$10 Million in Federal Funds for Homeland Security Grant Awards

RICHMOND—On behalf of the Secretary of Public Safety and Homeland Security, the Virginia Department of Emergency Management (VDEM) today announced more than \$10 million in Homeland Security Grant Awards to enhance emergency preparedness and security throughout the Commonwealth of Virginia. Each year, VDEM coordinates an annual stakeholder-driven review process to allocate and administer these funds that support a wide array of emergency preparedness and security operations, equipment replacement, training, planning and exercise programs by local governments and entities. Grant allocations will be made available tomorrow, September 17, 2020.

“I am proud of this substantial investment in emergency preparedness, training, and security processes across the Commonwealth,” **said the Secretary of Public Safety and Homeland Security Brian J. Moran.** “VDEM continues to successfully engage with local stakeholders and federal agencies to bring in the resources necessary to protect the health and safety of all Virginians.”

Competitive Grants

The State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) is one component of six programs announced by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in June. VDEM received 153 grant requests totaling nearly \$14.4 million for the competitive portion of these federal funds. Sixty-four projects were awarded a total of \$3.7 million from competitive SHSP funds. The Virginia Modeling and Simulation Center (VMASC) at Old Dominion University manages a peer-review process conducted by Virginia’s public safety stakeholders for competitive grants, and scores proposals based upon benefit-cost ratios. Awards fund a diverse group of programs such as community outreach and preparedness programs, interoperability efforts, sheltering, equipment enhancement, and exercises.

Emergency managers throughout Virginia have worked to become more strategic about allocating our limited funding to meet the greatest needs with VDEM support. Nearly 200 local leaders from the fields of emergency management, law enforcement, fire and rescue, and emergency medical services, representing communities throughout Virginia, participated in evaluating potential projects to allocate this limited funding that seeks to provide the most benefit.

FEMA has implemented four national priority services areas for the FY2020 funding cycle. The new federal requirements necessitate a 5% contribution from each of the following four national priority investment areas:

- Enhancing Cyber Security (including election security) – 5%
 - Enhancing protection of soft targets/crowded places – 5%
 - Enhancing information and intelligence sharing – 5%
 - Addressing emergent threats (such as unmanned aerial systems and weapons of mass destruction) – 5%

Due to the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, FEMA made accommodations to states during the application submissions, but have placed a hold on funding for projects that are identified as meeting a national priority in the project portfolio in the total of \$1.7 million for SHSP. This hold is anticipated to remain until the Spring of 2021.

Non-Competitive Grants

Public safety stakeholders will be allocated \$2.5 million in non-competitive grants from this year's SHSP program to fund 28 projects sustaining 12 hazardous materials teams, seven technical rescue teams, four incident management teams, five radio communications caches, and the Virginia Fusion Center.

Hampton Roads Urban Area Security Initiative (HR UASI)

\$2.8 million was awarded to HR UASI to address the unique needs of this high-threat, high-density urban area. As with SHSP funds, UASI funds of \$700,000 will be placed on hold for projects that are identified as meeting one of the four national priorities.

Non-Profit Security Grant

This grant provides funding support for target hardening and other physical security enhancements and activities to eligible nonprofit organizations that are at high risk of a terrorist attack in Virginia. VDEM received 26 project applications from both the statewide and Hampton Roads program totaling just over \$1.3 million, with \$991k million being funded by FEMA.
