1 Know Your Neighbors

Your own neighbors are often your single best security device. Unfortunately, many of us do not know our neighbors.

Neighborhoods in which people are truly concerned about mutual safety have extremely low burglary rates.

You can begin to build a neighborhood security system by:

- Showing an interest in your neighborhood's safety
- Getting acquainted with your neighbor's everyday living patterns
- Utilizing social media platforms like NextDoor.com

2 Set up/Attend a Meeting

Have an initial meeting for the community with residents wishing to start a Neighborhood Watch program.

3 Meet Your Liaison

Have a neighborhood rep meet with your Community Liaison Officer at a Citizens' Advisory Committee (CAC) meeting.
